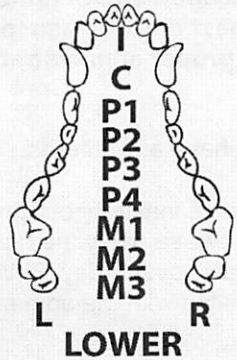
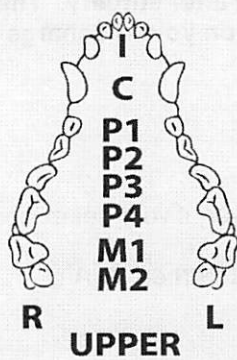

Biosyn Size: 3-0

All extractions performed by elevating the gingiva, sectioning multirooted teeth with the high speed drill and extracting the roots with an elevator. All extractions closed with biosyn using a combination of simple interrupted, cruciate, or/and simple continuous. /sg

Pertinent Information not noted in dental Chart: none

See attached log for presurgical PE, anesthetic monitoring, Medications, and recovery notes.

Dental Procedure:

1. Periodontal Disease evaluated,
2. Diseased or painful teeth that would not respond to medical care were extracted
3. Scaling followed by enamel polishing and fluoride treatment was performed.
4. Anesthesia, monitoring, and recovery were normal.
5. your pet's teeth and gums are healthier after the dental cleaning. Accumulation of plaque and tartar causes pressure and inflammation of the gum tissue and the mouth becomes a source of infection for other body tissues. Therefore it is very important to provide home dental healthcare to maintain good oral health.

Home Care Instructions:

Your pet had ___ infected and painful teeth removed.

PROPER RESTRAINT & EXERCISE: Please protect your pet when leaving the hospital by either a leash or a carrier. Do not allow your pet to become overly active and excited. Avoid access to stairs or situations that may lead to injury. Due to the anesthesia, he/she may be groggy for 12 hours. Your pet **can resume normal activity tomorrow.**

FOOD AND WATER: With the excitement of returning home, your pet may be inclined to drink and eat excessively, which may result in vomiting. To avoid this, we recommend restricting access to water for an hour or until your pet has quieted down. Then, allow only small amounts for the first 8 hours.

DIET:

Your pet did not have invasive extractions. Feed your pet his/her regular diet.

MEDICATION:

Dispensed, follow directions on prescription label.

A pain medication and/or antibiotic may be prescribed to your pet for after surgery. These medications will be started the next day. Please follow the instructions on the bottle and on your discharge instructions carefully to ensure proper administration.

SUTURES:

Your pet does not have any sutures.

MONITOR: A decrease in activity or appetite for one or two days is normal. However, if your pet exhibits any of the following symptoms, please notify the hospital 1) Loss of appetite for over 2 days 2) Refusal to drink water over 1 day. 3) Weakness; 4) Depression; 5) Vomiting; 6) Diarrhea; 7) Any illness directly associated with the administration of medication.

RECHECKS:

Please schedule a recheck with the doctor in **14** days to evaluate your pet's mouth is healing well and that none of the sutures need removed.

HOME DENTAL CARE: To ensure your pet's oral health, it is recommended you begin brushing with a finger brush and enzymatic tooth paste 3 times weekly after the mouth heals. Start in 2 weeks.
